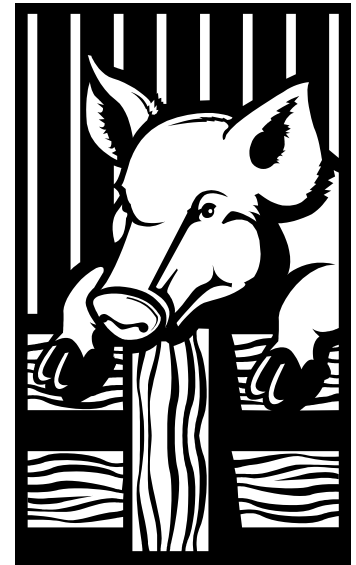

DIRECTIONS FOR FILLING OUT ENTRIES

1. Fill out only ONE entry per exhibitor. Enter under only one youth organization.
2. Fill out EVERY line on the entry completely. This information is necessary to process your entries.
3. Make sure that they are received by the fair on or before May 31, 2025.
4. No additional entries or changes after June 20, 2025.
5. Showmanship must be entered on entry.
6. All lots in Department 1 through 30 marked with a (NE) cannot be entered on your entry blank. Exhibitors in those lots will earn their entry during judging.

Those exhibitors who wish to stay on the grounds over night must pick up a permission card at the office for parent's signature.

Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors at the Stoughton Fair

IMPORTANT: Please read these regulations carefully!

1. Departments 1 through 28 are open to any member in good standing with youth organizations such as FFA, FHA, 4-H, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. You must be a member of a youth organization to exhibit. All exhibitors will follow the 4-H age to exhibit in all the departments. 4-H membership is open to all youth beginning in 5K (five-year-old Kindergarten) through one year beyond high school graduation and not to extend beyond the age of 19 as of December 31 of the enrollment year.
 - 1a. DEFINITIONS: Clover Buds will NOT be allowed to exhibit in Departments 1 – Dairy, 2 – Beef, 3 – Swine, 4 – Sheep, 5 – Goats, 7 – Poultry, 8 – Rabbits, and 9 – Cavies for reasons of safety.
2. All items exhibited must be the result of the exhibitor's project work for the exhibit year.
3. All exhibitors must be up to date with project requirements to be eligible for participation at the fair.
4. All exhibits must be in place by 8:00 p.m. Tuesday and remain until 6:00 p.m. SUNDAY. PLEASE PICK UP PREMIUMS BEFORE YOU LEAVE THE GROUNDS ON SUNDAY.
5. All entries must be submitted online no later than May 31. Late entries will not be processed. Please check entry tags when you receive them to make sure they correspond with the entries you made. No additional entries or changes will be made after June 20, 2025.
6. Vocational instructors and club leaders are responsible for all entries of exhibitors from their organizations.
7. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per lot. Check individual departments for their entry limits.
8. All livestock exhibitors are required to furnish feed, water, and bedding as well as feed/water containers for their animals. Any exhibitor who does not properly care for their livestock while at the fair, will have necessary costs charged to them. Livestock exhibitors must keep their stalls open and their stock uncovered between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. during each day of the fair. Unloading/loading of livestock will be permitted in designated areas only. Check with superintendents for more information.
 - 8a. Livestock exhibits must be shown by the exhibitor unless special arrangements are made with the superintendents.
 - 8b. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits and Poultry manure waste will be collected in manure spreaders each day. Exhibitors are asked to cooperate with keeping cans and other waste out of the spreaders. Before leaving the fairgrounds each exhibitor is required to clean out their pens, stalls or cages.
9. ALL ENTRIES ARE EXHIBITED AT THE EXHIBITOR'S RISK. The Stoughton Fair Association will take responsible precautions but will not be responsible for damages, loss or theft. Uniformed Police will be on the grounds day and night to preserve order and protect property.
10. All departments will be judged on the Danish or group basis.
11. Premiums will not be awarded to unworthy exhibits or those indicating misrepresentation.
12. Any exhibitor, or friend/relative of exhibitor who interferes with any judge or superintendent in their work in any way, will cause the exhibits of said exhibitor to be disqualified from receiving any award or prize.
13. Any person who violates any of these rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums, and be subject to such penalties as the Fair Board may order.
14. Any emergency not provided for in these rules shall be referred to the Fair Board and their decision shall be final.

Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2025 Season

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INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS (IAFE) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in the competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drugs residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for the show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with the applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance in the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be the prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered of a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct towards them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility of an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Judging Regulations

1. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair, nor shall any person interested directly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals shown in that department.
2. No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the lot in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of the perfection in the class.
3. When lots in the junior and educational departments are judges according to the Danish system, 4 group placings must be awarded in any lot. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the lot, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first two groups and not more than 6 in the first three groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the lot, there shall not be more than 25 percent in the first group, not more than 50 percent in the first two groups, and not more than 75 percent in the first three groups. The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

Judges' Duties

1. No exhibitor shall act as a judge in the department in which they exhibit.
2. Any exhibitor attempting to influence the judge in their work, in any manner, shall forfeit all premiums awarded and will be excluded from further competition.
3. When the exhibits are not deemed worthy, the judge will refuse to award a premium whether there be competition or not.
4. When respectfully requested, the judges are expected to give reasons for their decisions; stating what constitute special points of excellence in the class of animals or articles being considered, and pointing out superiority of one over another.
5. Judges will make their report of awards to the superintendents in charge, properly sign judging sheets, and turn judging sheets into the secretary's office promptly after awards are made.

Duties of Fair Superintendents

1. Give judge recommendations to fair secretary. Fair secretary will send out contract.
2. Give suggestions for new superintendents to fair secretary.
3. Superintendents shall make suggestions for the improvement of their department to the fair board. Make suggestions for the premium book.
4. Fair Board will not reimburse for any dollar amount that is not approved by the fair board.
5. Sponsor names need to be submitted for fair board before contacting sponsors.
6. Set-up before the fair, help clean and arrange displays.
7. Superintendents need to be on duty in their department:
 - a. Entry day: 3:00pm – 8:00pm
 - b. Judging Day: check time and day of judging
 - c. Release day: 5:30pm – 8:00pm (any exhibits left after 8:00pm will be brought to office.)
 - d. LIVESTOCK: All livestock needs to be checked in when unloading. All animals shown at the Stoughton Fair must be identified and records must be kept with the fair secretary for 5 years. A livestock superintendent must be on duty from 4:00pm – 9:00pm, or make arrangements for an assistant to be there. Contact fair secretary with changes.

8. Superintendents should aid all exhibitors in entering and displaying exhibits, and if so requested, assists judges in affixing ribbons, but must take no part in the judging itself. Assist the judge in completing the judge's sheets completely and accurately and turning them into the secretary's office when judging is finished.
9. After judging arrange exhibits in an attractive way. Check department daily.
10. In livestock areas make sure exhibitors are keeping pens clean and animals are fed and watered. NOTE: PLEASE SUPERVISE MANURE REMOVAL AT RELEASE TIME. HELP WITH CLEAN-UP.

SUPERINTENDENTS AND ANIMAL WELL BEING

To all superintendents and fair exhibitors

Health and wellbeing of the animals at the Stoughton fair grounds is the extremely important to us as disease and outbreaks are becoming more abound we want everyone, making sure that we are not spreading them to other farms or fairs.

As most of the exhibitors, should understand that diseases and bugs can infect other species other than what they brought to the fair. As superintendents and Fair board members we need to maintain a healthy environment for our continued fair success.

Rules for Bringing animals as well as the superintendents

1. All animals being shown at the fair must be in good health.
2. Superintendent's if you feel that animals are not in good health you have the right to have a vet examine or ask the exhibitor to take the animal in question back home.

(Superintendents we have vet access through Country View Veterinary Service if we need something they will come and look at the animals.)

3. To all exhibitors superintendents, veterinarian and fair board have final say on these matters above if an animal is in question.

DAIRY CATTLE

REGULATIONS

1. All dairy exhibits must be checked in between 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Tuesday.
2. All classes will be judged on the Danish or group basis.
3. All animals exhibited must be the result of regular 4-H, FFA, Junior Dairyman or Junior Holstein project work
4. Exhibitors must keep their areas clean during the fair. Areas cleaned often with manure being deposited in manure area by 8:30 a.m. An adequate bedding pack of no more than 6² should be maintained.
5. Exhibitors are required to clean areas at release time. Pitch manure to center. Follow superintendent's direction.
6. Only one animal may be shown per class by an exhibitor. **NO CLOVERBUDS.**
7. Third and fourth graders may show spring, winter and fall calves. A yearling may be shown if the member has carried a dairy project the previous year.
8. No exhibitor may enter more than four (4) dairy animals except five (5) animals may be shown if the 5th one is a cow. Note: The dairy committee reserves the right to make stall assignments adjustments according to the number of animal actually present at the fair.
9. Registration papers will be checked on all purebred entries. Your leader or advisor will check these papers at a designated time and place with fair officials. The animal is to be registered in the name of the junior exhibitor or in the name of the junior exhibitor as co-owner except in the case of a managerial animal.
10. A managerial animal is an animal that is shown but not owned by the exhibitor.
11. All dairy and livestock projects must be started no later than May 1 of exhibit year.
12. All calves and yearlings must have been purchased by May 1 of exhibit year. All other aged animals must be purchased by January 1 of exhibit year.
13. Each club must have someone in charge of the exhibit at all times.
14. Exhibitors must bring their own feed and bedding. Shavings no longer available from fair.
15. Judging of dairy cattle will start with Showmanship lots at 9:00 a.m. Thursday. **ENTRY TAGS ARE REQUIRED FOR SHOWMANSHIP.** Judging of the Dairy Show will begin after Sr. Showmanship Thursday approximately 11:00 a.m.
16. Failure to follow any of the rules or regulations stated will result in an automatic fourth (pink) placement.
17. A congeniality award will be selected by the judge based on sportsmanship, showmanship and courtesy inside and outside the dairy show ring.
18. Only female dairy cattle may be shown at Stoughton Fair.
19. All dairy animals must be in the dairy barn. The west side of the beef barn is no longer available with the exception of the open show.
20. All fitting chutes must be put away daily if used.

21. All lactating dairy cattle are required to have a negative Influenza A test from a milk sample collected within 7 days of movement to the fair.

Show Order

The Breed order will be: Milking Shorthorn, Ayrshire, Jersey, Guernsey, Brown Swiss and Holstein.

Age Classification

- SPRING CALF**—Born on or after March 1 of exhibit year.
WINTER CALF—Born between December 1 of year preceding exhibit year and February 28/29 of exhibit year.
FALL CALF—Born between September 1 and November 30 of year preceding exhibit year.
SUMMER YEARLING—Born between June 1 and August 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
SPRING YEARLING—Born between March 1 and May 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
WINTER YEARLING—Born between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28/29 of the year preceding exhibit year.
FALL YEARLING—Born between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding exhibit year.
TWO-YEAR-OLD COW—Born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year to August 31 of second year preceding the exhibit year, and shall include Fall/Winter Yearlings which have freshened.
THREE-YEAR-OLD COW—Born between September 1 of the fourth year preceding to August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
AGED COW—Born prior to September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.
DRY COW—Three years old or over. Cow has milked a minimum of 285 days.

The purpose of the club award is to encourage each 4-H Club and FFA Chapter in the district to keep their animals, alleys, feed, etc., in a neat and orderly fashion. Clubs are encouraged, but not required to use educational and promotional information for their displays. The 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters should have an attendant in charge at all times.

AWARD BASED ON:

1. The cleanliness and neatness of livestock exhibit.



2. The attractiveness of feed, bedding, and equipment storage.
3. The regular disposal of waste.
4. The cleanliness and neatness of aisles.
5. Safety and courtesy of club members to each other, leaders, superintendents and spectators.

13. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to check in at the ring they will be showing in before their class begins. You need to let the ring stewards know if you have a conflict between the dog show and another show.
 - a. Conflicts with other species shown at the fair may occur. The superintendents will do their best to accommodate these conflicts within reason and at the discretion of the superintendents.
 - b. Showmanship will be run oldest to youngest at the beginning of the show. Showmanship can not be held to accommodate other species conflicts - see superintendent for details.
 - c. Obedience can leave armband number order but only until last present exhibitor enters the ring
 - d. Superintendents reserve the right to change the order of classes to accommodate exhibitor schedules.

The following describes the rules and regulations of the
Stoughton Fair Meat Animal Sale.

GENERAL RULES

1. Auction entries will be completed through Fair Entry Online like the rest of the fair. You must be entered by May 31 to be eligible for the sale. You do not need to have a specific animal selected at the time of entry – only the species to be sold.
2. The meat animal sale is open to all exhibitors that show market animals. The sale is broken into 2 categories: large and small animals.
3. Each exhibitor may sell one lot in each category.
4. Each entry must be of a meat breed.
5. Each entry must be shown in the correct class.
6. Each exhibitor must also show in the showmanship class for the species they are selling.
7. See below for head/lot limits for each species.
8. Beef steers are expected to be castrated at least 60 days in advance.
9. If an exhibitor is disqualified in any show due to cheating, misconduct, etc. they will not be allowed to sell.
10. All exhibitors are expected to market their animal to potential buyers and invite them to come to the auction.
11. All exhibitors must display a thank you card next to their identification/barn card. All other forms of thanks are up to the exhibitor.
12. All exhibitors selling at the sale will be expected to certify that the animals being sold are drug free at the date of sale. This is a regulation with state and federal laws regarding meat animals.
13. If an animal is deemed unhealthy or unfit to sell will not be allowed to sell. The final decision will be made by a staff veterinarian.
14. Each exhibitor will be expected to sign an affidavit stating that the animal originated in the United States of America.
15. Any issues exhibitor has needs to be brought to the attention of the Meat Sale Committee by Thursday of Fair Week.
16. Exhibitors MUST be present to sell. If an exhibitor cannot be present they MUST be pre-approved by sale superintendent.
17. The Stoughton Fair Meat Animal Sale Committee reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations, accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.
18. Rules are subject to change due to industry and animal health regulations.
19. All exhibitors are responsible for arranging meat processing (both small and large) and transportation of sold animal to the selected processor. Exhibitors should pro actively seek out meat processors for their animal to be processed at prior to the sale. It is the exhibitors responsibility to discuss with the buyer where their animal should be taken to and when.

**Small Animal Sale – Chickens,
Rabbits, Ducks, Turkeys**

20. All exhibitors selling under the Small Animal Auction will be expected to dress and deliver the animal, if requested to do so, by the buyer within 2 weeks of the Stoughton Jr. Fair. Exhibitors must include their name, full address and final dressed weight.
21. Animals must meet current industry standards based on quality and weight. The following rules will be used as guidelines for the sale.

Chickens: Broilers: 3-5 lbs., **Roasters:** 5.1-10 lbs.

Rabbits Single Fryer/Meat Pens:3.5-5.5 lbs.,

Roasters: over 5.5 lbs.

Ducks: No guidelines

Turkeys: No guidelines
